Animal Shelters are bursting at the seams. How can you help? By Misty Mills

1. Keep your pets. Even if you move. Even if you get married. Even if you change jobs. There is literally no room at the inn.

2. Have your pets spayed and neutered. There is no such thing as an accidental litter of puppies or kittens. If your pets are unaltered, you ARE putting yourself in the very predictable situation of having a litter of puppies or kittens. This isn't a surprise or an accident.

3. Have your pets microchipped and REGISTER the chip. Microchips are no help if your name and contact information aren't available when the chip is scanned.

4. Put a collar and tag on your dog or cat with your phone number on it. It's the fastest way to get a lost animal returned to you.

5. Don't leave pets outdoors unattended, especially during holidays. Bring them inside. Fences fall down. Gates get blown open. Animals get stolen. YOU may know your pet will come home. The good Samaritan who finds them wandering the neighborhood won't. The unsuspecting person trying to walk or jog the neighborhood has no way of knowing if your pet is safe if they are approached by your unattended animal.

6. Adopt from the shelter. They have cats, dogs, puppies and kittens of every possible color, coat type and breed. If they don't have what you're looking for today, they probably will tomorrow or next week. They are inundated with animals. Adopt. Adopt. Adopt.

7. Foster a shelter animal. The staff and volunteers are doing their absolute best, but all animals fare better in a home setting. Foster for the shelter directly. Foster for a rescue group. You will be saving lives.

8. Volunteer. Go wash some laundry. Do some cleaning. Take some dogs out for a walk, or spend some time snuggling a cat or kitten.

9. Donate. Time. Money. Supplies.

10. Educate your friends and neighbors. Some people don't adopt because they are truly unaware of how dire the situation is in our communities. Talk about it. Let people know.

TINY HOMES, GUEST HOMES, and TRAVEL TRAILERS/RVs

Recently we have had lots of questions about tiny homes, guest homes and travel trailers/ recreational vehicles. Below are the TVACC Guidelines that address some of the issues being inquired about. For a full copy of the TVACC guidelines please visit www.TahitianVillage.org or call our office for more information.

- Tiny homes are not allowed in Tahitian Village
- Guest houses cannot be rented
- Travel Trailers and Recreational Vehicle cannot be used as a residence, guest house or living quarters

A primary residence (single family home) in Tahitian Village must have a minimum of square footage of 1,200 square feet under air conditioning/heating. This is the smallest single family home that can be built in Tahitian Village.

TVACC Building Guidelines

B. Assembling the Residential/ Commercial Application Package

2.The plans must include sufficient design detail showing where brick, stone, wood, and roofing will be used. Although more details are outlined in other parts of the Guidelines, please be aware that *all single-family homes must have a minimum of 1,200 square feet of living area.* In addition, all houses must have a garage either attached or detached. All houses must have a 9-1-1 address.

A "guest house" may be constructed after, or at the same time a "primary residence" is built. Guest houses must be between 600 and 850 square feet and for the sole use of a family member or a guest. A guest house cannot be rented, and cannot be a rented as an Air B&B, or VRBO. Guest homes cannot be revenue generating.



14. No guest home, outbuilding, shed, RV, or other structure may be used as a rental property in Tahitian Village

3. Garages, sheds and other outbuildings

f) A recreational vehicle or travel trailer **may not** be used as a residence, guest housing, or living quarters at any time.

Just a couple of questions to get us started: How many of you think we have been working on Lovers Lane all of this year and last? How many realize that Lovers Lane is the most traveled County Road in Bastrop County?

Hopefully by the time this is published Lovers Lane will be done for the next 10 years. With more than 3,000 vehicles per day using Lovers Lane, it is undisputedly the most traveled County Road in Bastrop County followed closely by Tahitian Dr. which is just less than 3,000 vehicles per day. Other than emergency calls to our other 150 miles of road in Precinct 1, our crew has been busy trying to get Lovers Lane widened from 18' to 24' plus turn lanes in front of the BISD. They have suffered weather delays, utility movement delays and of course the delay of working the road and keeping the traffic moving. As those of you who use it daily realize, driving around big equipment is dangerous and not fun.

Again, the final goal for Lovers Lane is to widen it, get the turn lane lines in place and the striping completed to make it more drivable and less complicated. And we want a surface finish that will give you and the crew a minimum maintenance driving experience over the next 10 plus years.



A Message from the ACC President

Hello, Neighbors -

As summer approaches it's important to note that The Climate Prediction Center is predicting a hotter and dryer summer than average for Texas and most of the U.S., and because we live in a forest that means our fire danger increases as well.

So let's get fire ready:

- 1. Abide by local Burn Bans.
- 2. Regularly clear leaves, pine needles and other debris from gutters, leaves, porches and decks.
- 3. Remove flammable materials such as dead vegetation from within 30 feet of your house and outbuildings, including firewood stacks and propane bottles (and BBQ grills), and even mulch or pine straw used in flower beds next to your house.
- 4. Utilize the Clean Sweep and chipping shredding events to keep your home free of unnecessary flammable items.
- 5. Install or maintain your smoke alarms and test your smoke alarms once a month.
- 6. Roofs should be installed or replaced with a Class-A rated roof.
- 7. Keep embers out of your house by covering exterior attic vents and under-eave vents with metal wire mesh no larger than 1/8".
- 8. Make sure street signs and home address numbers are highly visible to help firefighters and other emergency responders find your property quickly.
- 9. Develop an evacuation plan including several different ways to safely get out of your home and out of the subdivision.
- 10. Review your homeowners insurance policy.
- 11. Prepare or update a list of your home's contents with photos or videos.
- 12. When using a fire pit (when there is not a Burn Ban), always keep the fire pit at least 30 feet from your home, and have a water hose within easy reach, and ready to go.
- 13. Lastly, be kind to your neighbors. Talk to adjacent property owners before you many any changes, since some actions on your part may affect their property.
